

2021 Violence Prevention Indicators Data Package



DATA PACKAGE OVERVIEW

Violence affects everyone in LA County, whether it is directly experienced, witnessed, or shared via newsfeed. Violence also is directly connected to individual physical, mental, and emotional health and wellbeing. While violence affects and has an impact on every community, it does not impact all communities equally. Some communities, particularly communities of color, are disproportionately impacted by violence compared to others. Similarly, other groups are disproportionately impacted by specific forms of violence, such as intimate partner or gang violence, compared to others.

The following data package includes an overview of data relating to the general demographics of people who live in each Service Planning Area (SPA) in Los Angeles County; information about incidents of and reports of violence; and an overview of various health outcomes impacting children and adults. It is intended to be used as a resource to help gain a deeper understanding of who lives within each SPA and what health outcomes those individuals and groups are experiencing. Some of these indicators relate directly to violence, such as gun vendors in a community, and others relate more indirectly, such as poverty or employment.

This data package has been broken into a series of sections that groups relevant information together into topics. Each indicator (each point of data that measures an outcome) that has been included in the package includes data the overall county level and for each unique SPA. For some of these indicators, however, information has only been included at the County level.

In addition to the main data sections, this data package also includes:

- A series of maps to provide a visual representation of health outcomes in Los Angeles County.
- Links to additional reading and resources to learn more about Los Angeles County, including links highlighting racial equity and community resiliency. While reading these resources is optional, we highly recommend that you review them for a deepened understanding of the challenges caused and maintained by racial inequity.

Please note that the data included in this package comes from a variety of sources. Therefore, the years during which each point of data was collected may vary. Additionally, not all group titles that are usually used interchangeably may mean the same thing. For example, the terms "teens" and "youth" may refer to different age groups that are clarified and defined in footnote sources. For this reason, it is highly recommended to read through the sources of each indicator as you use this data package.








ASSAULT-RELATED NON-FATAL HOSPITALIZATIONS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY (2016-2020)






NON-FATAL HOSPITALIZATIONS DUE TO SELF-HARM IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY (2016-2020)






EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND HEAD START LOCATIONS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY






PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY






DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH PROVIDERS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY






PUBLICLY AVAILABLE PARKS AND OPEN SPACES IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY






VETERAN SERVICES PROVIDERS IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY








NUMBER OF FEDERALLY LICENSED FIREARM VENDORS PER LOS ANGELES COUNTY ZIP CODE

Equity-related Resources

- 1. An Equity Profile of the Los Angeles (2017): This report highlights widening inequities in health, income, opportunity, and wealth throughout Los Angeles County. The report, written by PolicyLink and the Program for Environmental and Regional Equity at USC, describes long-standing inequities throughout the region and the disproportional burden that this places on communities of color. An abridged version of the report can be found here.
- 2. <u>LA VS. Hate:</u> This is a community-centered program designed intentionally to address the normalization of hate in our county and to inspire and equip residents to stand against it. The website includes resources related to bystander intervention, reporting, and exploring social justice opportunities.
- 3. <u>Million Dollar Hoods:</u> The purpose of Million Dollar Hoods is to provide information about the burden of mass incarceration, both on individual and community wellbeing and financially. This research project includes maps of the cost and impact of incarceration, reports on racial inequities, and a brief history of the impact of mass incarceration on Black, Latinx, Indigenous, and working Los Angelenos.
- **4.** EdBuild Broken Public School Systems: This map presents information about poverty, free and reduced lunch, racial demographics, and household income data for school-aged children in every U.S. school district. The map also presents information about how much each school district spends per student. The purpose of this map is to compare this information across districts to identify which students may have higher needs and which districts may need more investments. The maps have also been updated to reflect the impact COVID-19 has had on school systems.
- 5. <u>LA County Anti-Racism, Diversity, and Inclusion Initiative</u>: This is a LA County Board of Supervisors-led initiative that articulates anti-racism as a priority agenda area for county leadership and residents.
- **6.** <u>U.S. Census Bureau's Community Resilience Estimates (2020):</u> This tool visualizes the risk every U.S. neighborhood faces from potential local or intentional disasters, such as COVID-19, earthquakes, fires, and more and the challenges they might face when recovering from this disaster.
- 7. <u>U.S. Census Bureau's Opportunity Atlas</u>: Compares childhood outcomes to adulthood experiences to make a connection between the two.
